

Letter from our Youth Worker

You will have heard of the 12 days of Christmas, but have you heard of the 50 days of Easter?

When we are getting ready for something, often we spend more time and effort getting ready than actually doing the thing itself. When we were planning our wedding, it took months and months of planning - sending out invitations, finding places for people to stay, picking the hymns, getting the rings (which I may or may not have lost, six weeks into married life.... At least Chris already knew I should not be trusted with jewellery). There is so much to do and then the day goes by in a flash. We get so wrapped up in the preparations that when the day finally comes we are so grateful to have got there that we can be guilty of forgetting to celebrate!

Over in the church centre on the first Sunday of Lent we talked to the children about how we are given 40 days to get ready for Easter, 40 days to prepare. We will each have done that in our own way, maybe through fasting, daily challenges, prayer and reflection. But now, after 40 days, then entering the darkness and sadness of Holy Week we have finally made it: He is risen! Let the celebrations begin! Jesus rising from the dead is so momentously huge and life altering, that here at church we give over a whole 50 days to celebrating that truth all the way up to Pentecost. 40 days to get ready, 50 days to celebrate - that sounds more like it!

With that in mind, I wonder how you are going to celebrate this Easter season? Maybe you will celebrate quietly, loudly, by yourself, with others, with food, with song, with prayer, with thanksgiving? Well, either way you have got 50 days..... why not try them all?

An update from Compassion on the current crisis in Haiti.

Haiti has experienced many challenges in recent years. Political instability, economic

insecurity and food scarcity have caused violence to dominate the major cities. We all feel heartbroken at the current crisis the people of Haiti are facing and we wanted to share an update and invite you to join us in praying for the nation of Haiti.

To minimise risk to the safety and well-being of children, families, staff, and volunteers, our church partners will adjust or pause in-person meetings as necessary. Some church partners in areas with high levels of gang violence have temporarily paused meetings at the Compassion project. In these cases, our partners will deliver programming as they are able. This might be through home visits or other virtual options. Compassion's teams continue to monitor the situation closely, and we'll provide updates as we have them.

Join us in praying for:

- The restoration of security throughout the country of Haiti.
- Protection of and provision for children, youths and their families living in areas affected by insecurity or who have been displaced by the unrest.
- Wisdom, discernment and protection for pastors, staff, social workers, volunteers and their families as they continue to serve in the midst of these extremely difficult circumstances.
- The protection of all Compassion Haiti staff who are living and working in hostile areas.
- Health and protection from cholera and other illnesses.

Your continued support is critical during this time, and we can't thank you enough.

Christian Aid Week 2024 - 12-18 May

This year's appeal is focusing on Burundi, one of the most densely populated and poorest countries in Africa. Heavily reliant on agriculture,

it's also one of the least prepared to combat the effects of climate change, including droughts, floods and landslides. The global cost of living crisis has intensified the challenges: more than 70 per cent of the population live in poverty and more than half of children are chronically malnourished.

Alongside local partners, Christian Aid, helps establish Village Savings and Loans Associations (VSLAs). These community-led groups mean people can save and borrow money, making small businesses possible, so families can eat regularly, get medicine when they need it, and build safer homes.

Thirty-five-year-old Aline Nibogora is the chairperson of a VSLA which supports some 25 families in a remote village in Makamba Province. Aline escaped an abusive marriage only to find herself on the streets begging for a place to stay. Her life changed when she went to a Christian Aid-funded community workshop. With a small start-up loan, Aline began trading avocados and peanuts locally. She's now a grocery wholesaler and living on her own plot of land where she's building a home for her family. In the next five years she hopes to expand, so one day she can buy a mill. This will provide a source of income without the need to transport heavy goods over long distances.

"I don't want my children to have a painful life like mine, remembering it makes me weep. I could never have dreamed I would one day have a brick house and be a successful businesswoman, able to feed and clothe my children. This is a plan and I will do it; I am a woman who is an achiever."

Like last year, we'll be having a collection for Christian Aid on Sunday 12th May and there will also be an e-envelope to give directly to the Christian Aid website. Look out for more information in May's magazine and in church.

View from the Pews

Guildford Cathedral hosts 90s disco in the nave

What are your thoughts on reading that headline? Are you shocked and outraged at such a violation of a sacred space? Or are you

encouraged by this innovative way to attract a different section of the community into the cathedral?

Firstly let's affirm that the discos are silent, and people dance to music played through their wireless headphones. The music is broadcast via a radio transmitter, rather than using a speaker system. So anyone present who is not wearing headphones can hear no music. The effect is therefore of a room full of people dancing to nothing. The company organising the discos is holding a whole series of events throughout 2024 at venues including Guildford, Winchester and Canterbury cathedrals.

In John Chapter 2 we read the account of Jesus driving the moneychangers and the market stallholders out of the temple in Jerusalem. 'Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!' So how is this any different? Can we condone such 'raves in the naves' where our great cathedrals are being turned into nightclubs? Critics argue that cathedrals are sacred spaces, built for the worship of God, and discos are 'profane and sacrilegious'. They say that such events will not bring young people closer to Christ, showing instead that entertainment is more deserving of our attention than God. Perhaps they also show that Christians do not take their faith or their holy places seriously. How would we feel if St John's were to host such an event?

On the other hand, we all know that cathedrals (and churches!) are very expensive to run, and Guildford cathedral must find over £1 million a year. There is no Government funding. Not only do music events like these generate income, but they are held at times when nothing else would be going on. Maybe attending a silent disco at Guildford cathedral will help to change people's perceptions, and knock down a few barriers. They are certainly very successful, with over 1,000 people attending two sessions on a Saturday night, each paying about £25 to enjoy the music. Guildford Cathedral's vision is 'open to God open to

all', and any revenue from events like these will help to fund worship and mission, care for the building, outreach, and staff needed to run operations.

So, let your opinions be known - and how about going along to one of these events to see for yourselves?!





About our Cathedral......



You may remember that last month I reported on the vandalism that resulted in the shattering of one of the panes of glass in the west front door of our Cathedral – part of a sacred set of sentinel angels engraved on each door by renowned artist John Hutton. At the moment, I have no further news on this only to say that I am

pursuing the story and will report on the outcome as soon as I can.

I visited our Cathedral this afternoon and discovered that unusually there were no welcoming guides at their desk. It was a bit disappointing as I like to have a conversation with them however brief it may be. So, left to my own devices I wandered around the passageways, chapels and wide-open spaces of the Cathedral's interior. All was quiet except for occasional and mysterious noises like the sound of distant doors banging or quick footsteps receding which reverberated and echoed around about me. There was no one in sight. I stood for a while and listened and tried to count the windows between the great columns on each side of the nave but soon gave up: there are far too many. The vast majority of the windows are clear glass towards the very top with a limited number of stained-glass images reserved for the base of each window. Idly I pondered what it might be like to be locked in overnight in our Cathedral. If it were a summer night one could wake in the early morning and watch the dawn light slowly creeping through the great eastward facing Round Window with its descending dove portrayed in a myriad of stained glass. On a bright morning the sunlight would be reflected through the multitude of colours as it moved down and across the interior walls and the great columns one by one. It would be a breathtaking sight. The moving pattern of colours slowly and eventually disappearing as the sun moved on its silent and inexorable journey across the heavens. So, come along with me and on a summer night we'll camp out together in our Cathedral and in the morning watch the fabulous light show. Don't forget your pillow!

Gardening hints for April

We have certainly had plenty of rain in the last month with no doubt more showers to come as we look forward in hope to May flowers.

Second early potatoes should be planted in the first half of the month leaving maincrop potatoes until the end of the month. Beetroot, carrots, leeks, lettuce, radishes, spring onions and turnips can now be sown outdoors. Brassicas should be sown in small pots for transplanting later in the summer. Broad beans which were sown indoors in the autumn can now be planted out. Tomato seedlings which have developed their first true leaves should be potted up.

Plant summer flowering bulbs such as gladioli and liliums. Remove faded daffodil and tulip flowers leaving the foliage to die back. Dead head pansy other spring flowering bedding plants to encourage a continuous display.

Sweet peas can still be sown outdoors, plant out autumn sown plants into their flowering positions. In the greenhouse sow the seeds of summer bedding plants such as French marigold and tagetes: once they have germinated and have produced a good pair of leaves they should be pricked out into seed boxes before they become leggy.

Cuttings can be taken from dahlias which were started into growth last month. Prune choisya, forsythia and viburnum immediately after flowering. Tie in honeysuckle and clematis branches as they begin to climb. Cut back lavender to keep the plant bushy; do not cut into old wood as it will not produce new growth. Lift and divide large clumps of herbaceous perennials. Increase the feeding and watering of indoor plants, repotting into a larger size pot any which are overcrowded or pot bound.

Mow the lawn when rain permits with the mower blades set on a higher cut, apply weed and feed with mosskiller or lawn sand as necessary. Slugs and snails are enjoying a banquet at this time of the year with new growth appearing everywhere. They are particularly looking forward to the new shoots of delphinium, hosta and lupin - use either animal friendly slug pellets or a dressing of sharp sand, grit or crushed eggshell to deter them. *John Boon*

Dear Friends,

As I write on the Spring Equinox, we are in that 'is it or isn't it?' phase. We have frogspawn in the pond, the crocus, primroses and daffodils are out around the field

and the children have been very quick to abandon their coats today! We have just a week left before we break up for our Easter holiday and still much to look forward to.

We were very lucky to have Ross from Surrey Wildlife team support us creating a new wildflower bed on the edge of our field as well as using the cut turf to create a 'bee bank' for the insects and a 'bug hotel'. We are hoping that these will make Merrow a veritable hive of insect activity in the summer months! Thank you to Mrs Tyson and the PTA for arranging and facilitating the gardening day!

The wonderful Open the Book team brought the story of The Great Parade to life for the children as they told of Jesus riding joyfully into Jerusalem. The children were very engaged in the story and were happy to share their new Open the Book song with our visitors!

Next week we will be walking up to St John's for our Easter service with Rev'd Tim and Georgie; we then have an Easter Pause day at school to give the children the opportunity to engage with some high-level thinking and reflection during an 'off-timetable' RE day, which also contributes to pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development. Throughout the day the children will have opportunities for creating artwork, taking part in role play and reflective story telling as well as creating Easter gardens.

In Early Years we follow some other Easter customs such as egg rolling, egg & spoon races and an Easter Egg Hunt – encouraging our youngest children to experience the different ways people may celebrate significant times in the Christian calendar.

Some of you may know that Church schools not only have the pleasure of Ofsted inspections but also SIAMS inspections (The Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools): we welcomed the inspector to Merrow on Thursday 14 March. We will share the report

with you as soon as it is published but we would like to thank Rev'd Tim, Georgie, Michael Eagle and all the parents who gave up their time to support us during the day.

Look out for the Easter Egg Trail around Merrow organised by our PTA. We wish you all a joyful Easter.
