From The Rectory

In March we are into the depths of Lent. Lent started with Ash Wednesday, when those who attended an Ash Wednesday service were marked on their forehead with ash.

During these services, the celebrant made a sign of the cross on people's foreheads with ash, reciting the words 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.' It's a deeply personal moment that reminds us firstly to thank God for our life on this earth and secondly of how fragile life can be. The ashes express the brokenness of nature and their use in the Liturgy of Ash Wednesday points us to God as the source of all wholeness.

Some of you may choose to have given up something up for Lent. However, I find it better to take something up for Lent. Taking something up is a positive action and Lent is a season that takes us toward the positive day of Easter – which also falls in March this year, on 31st March. Last year, I took up reading Archbishop Stephen Cottrell's Lent book called *Godforsaken*. The book was an excellent companion throughout the season and reading it also awoke within me an enjoyment of reading (I was not a great reader as a child) that has stuck with me. Taking up something for Lent is also harder than giving something up. But the results will be greater and better for us.

So my challenge for you this month, and as you prepare to plunge into the darkness of Lent and rise in the light of Easter, is to take something up for Lent. Do let me know what you take up and how it goes!



View from the Pews



Through my life I have sadly seen the steady decline in the number of people attending Midnight Mass at Christmas and other services, with the number of under 50's attending being very scarce. I love the 8 o'clock service and all the church traditions, and the archaic language, with words such as art, hallowed, trespasses, remission and lively sacrifice, but these words have no meaning to the youth of today, so there is a disconnect between these staid services and the world we now live in.

The world has moved so far since the 60's with technology revolutionising the way we live with items like mobile phones with their plethora of Apps and ways of communicating such as Facebook, X, snapchat etc. The church has to adapt if it is to be relevant in this new world.

Which is why I am so glad that we are looking to find funding with the initiative to raise £150K over the next 5 years in order to carry on with employing Georgie as Youth Worker. Yes, the church will and needs to look after the wishes of the existing congregation, but to be relevant it has to build the congregations of the future and this must be the priority, not that this means one size for all, but different services with relevance to the various sections of the congregation.

The church has no purpose if it is a place where you go to on a Sunday but has no other relevance. It has to be active in the community serving all people's needs, luckily we already have among other things a mother & toddler group, a youth café, and a coffee morning for the older members, but we need to build on these. With Georgie innovating new ideas and bringing life into our community I am sure we will make the church relevant to more young people.

The council is basically bankrupt and with however much good will, and regardless of whichever political party is in power, they will need to continue cutting back services. As this happens people already in need, will need others to replace this support in all manner of ways. The ethos of helping in the community is dying with younger people generally not seeing it as being anything to do with them and surely it is our duty as Christians to step up to the mark and be as the good Samaritan. If a close relation of yours was in need would you do anything in your power to help? Of course you would, so should we not do the same for others in our community? As the second commandment says love thy neighbour as thyself.

We all need to carry out more volunteering work, and hopefully convince others that this is not only essential but is also morally very rewarding and a Christian act of kindness to do so.

Celebrating Our Ofsted Rating

We are delighted to share that Merrow Infant C of E school has received a glowing assessment following our recent Ofsted Inspection.

The report affirms the school's commitment to providing high-quality care and education, highlighting the nurturing and inclusive environment that we are so proud of. It recognises that at the heart of our success is the emphasis on warm and respectful relationships within the school community and that our School Values are key to all we do. This creates a safe and supportive atmosphere where our children quickly develop confidence and are proud of the high quality work they produce.

The Inspector noted that staff have high expectations for pupils' behaviour, and the implementation of clear and consistent routines helps children meet these expectations. In addition, our broad and balanced curriculum focuses on the needs of all children, especially those with Special Education Needs and/or Disabilities, ensuring the strong foundations developed in our Early Years are built upon.

The report emphasises our commitment to embracing diversity. Children who speak English as an additional language (EAL) play a vital role in enriching the cultural tapestry of our school, sharing their experiences and fostering an environment where everyone is welcomed and respected.

Ofsted recognised the progress that the school has made in the past few years and the positive impact the Federation has had. The school is on an upward trajectory and has the capacity for further improvements.

Perhaps most gratifying is the overwhelming endorsement we received from our parents, who wholeheartedly support the school's work. One parent aptly summarised the sentiments of many, stating, "There is a high level of care and joy. Any child can flourish in this school."

For wonderful Health & Safety reasons we serve wrapped biscuits, so they can be reused if not eaten and have now found various sources to move away from just serving chocolate biscuits to include plain biscuits as well. On the last Wednesday of the month we serve savouries such as Sausage Rolls & Pizza which also goes down very well.

We have a couple of members who are Gluten free, and we provide Gluten free biscuits and cakes. We are happy to cater for any other dietary requirements, as long as we have warning.

Most of us know someone who is living with dementia which is why I thought it might be helpful to return to an article I wrote for the parish magazine in May 2015.

We are encouraged to remember five things about dementia

- It's not a natural part of ageing
- It's caused by diseases of the brain
- It's not just about your memory it can affect thinking, communicating and doing everyday tasks
- It's possible to live well with dementia
- There's more to a person than the dementia

With support, people with dementia can and do take an active role in life. Alzheimer's Society

So how can St John's create a more dementia friendly community?

- Become aware of those who appear to be in difficulty for whatever reason
- Do they know where to sit when they come into church?
- Can they find their place when returning from receiving Communion?

Sidespersons, in particular, could be ready to reassure in the event of a fire evacuation. People with dementia can find the unexpected difficult to handle.

Could you encourage them to stay for coffee after 10am service and go with them down to the Centre? It's a noisy environment. Where do you go to get the coffee? Where do you sit?

- Talk about happy times from years gone by, for example a parish fete, flower arranging. "I remember when we.....". Short term memory is often impaired.
- Try to avoid direct questions. A statement is often easier to deal with, for example, "I like your red coat...."

- Recognise that a person living with dementia often has low self esteem as he/she is likely to be aware that life is more difficult. Perhaps you could give them a lift when the Mothering Sunday posies are being made. A small group and the opportunity to create a posy could be very satisfying as well as being a social occasion. It's a good idea to telephone on the day to serve as a reminder.
- Laughter and music are both very therapeutic for everyone!
- Recognise that dementia affects individuals in different ways and that they can have difficult and also good days.

It's important to remember the carer/family member as he/she will be dealing with many issues on a practical and on an emotional level. Giving them time to talk over a coffee or an offer to stay with the person they care for whilst they go out for short periods of time can make an enormous difference to their lives.

NORTH GUILDFORD FOOD BANK – A LOOK BACK AT 2023

Dear Donors

After another busy year at North Guildford Food Bank I am writing to thank you so much for the support you have provided us in the past year. We have so many donors who give either produce or financial support and without you all, we would not have been able to serve the number of people we did in 2023.

- I have attached statistics which summarise our work in 2023. We have provided 1,709 food parcels, feeding 2,669 adults and 2072 children. This was a small increase of 43 parcels from the previous year.
- The main reasons for needing help this year were unemployment and debt. Our main referrers were Guildford Borough Council, Home School Link Workers and Citizens Advice.
- Since early 2023 we have no longer needed to provide funding for fuel vouchers, but instead, we partner with The Fuel Bank Foundation which is a charitable organisation. We refer our clients on prepayment meters who are in fuel poverty to the Fuel Bank Foundation and they provide fuel vouchers. The value of these vouchers varies depending on the time of year, but the aim is to provide sufficient fuel funding to last the household a week.
- Guildford Council Wellbeing team is continuing to provide a driver and van on Wednesdays to take parcels to clients who need them to be delivered and we have volunteer drivers to do deliveries on other days for clients who are housebound. Robin (GBC) is also very helpful in bringing boxes from supermarkets for us to pack parcels into.

Christmas 2023

 In the two weeks before Christmas we saw demand like never before and in December served 306 clients, compared to 200 in December last year. We are blessed to have some reserves in the bank so that we were able to buy more stock, in addition to food donations, which was needed on an almost daily basis. Our monthly spend on food more than doubled in December and our healthy stock levels were reduced to nothing for many foods.

- As last year, we increased our regular client sessions from three to four per week for the two weeks before Christmas. Due to the large numbers of clients, our volunteers started packing food parcels much earlier than normal and when demand was highest, we staggered client arrival times.
- We also provided Tesco vouchers to our clients in December, in addition to their food parcels, giving them the opportunity to buy extra items for their families over Christmas.
- We are very thankful for Guildford Lions who continue to buy eggs, potatoes and carrots for us each week. They have been so supportive, even when we had such an increase in demand.
- We are in the process of building our stocks and reserves up again, so please look on our Facebook page and website for our weekly requests. We are also so thankful to those of you who donate financially to the food bank as food donations alone are not sufficient to meet the needs of the number of clients who are being referred to us.

- North Guildford Food Bank more visible in the community.

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With all of the above in mind, your giving is more important than ever, so thank you. We will also put an annual update on our website within the next few days.

GARDENING HINTS FOR MARCH

We have so far been very lucky in not having had any snow just a few heavy frosts but this month can be traditionally be very cold so we need to be careful with any tender plants and not to put anything out too soon where it can be killed by frost

Things to do in the garden in March.

Shallots and Onion Sets should be planted this month and if it is mild Early Potatoes can be planted towards the end of the month.

Most vegetable seed can now be sown outdoors in prepared beds.

If you did not do so last month you can still sow Aubergine, Cucumber, Sweet Peppers and Tomatoes in a heated propagator or indoors.

Cut back last year's autumn fruiting Raspberry canes to ground level, prune Blueberries and Gooseberries and apply a dressing of a balanced fertilizer or Sulphate of Potash at 15g per sq m.

Basal cuttings of Dahlias should be taken this month to provide plants for summer flowering.

Sweet Peas can still be sown in a sheltered position.

Annuals such as Alyssum, Lobelia, and French Marigold should be sown indoors this month.

Remove the top 3" of compost from containers and replace with fresh.

Bush and Standard Roses should be pruned and fed with a Rose Fertiliser. Continue to prune summer flowering Shrubs and Dogwoods.

Large flowering Clematis which flower in May and June on short shoots from the previous year can have weak and dead stems removed in early Spring before growth begins.

Small flowering species such as "Montana" flower in early Spring on last year's growth, they need minimum pruning but if they begin to exceed their allotted space they should be pruned after flowering.

Large flowering species such as "Jackmanii" which bloom in late summer on the current year's growth should be pruned to a pair of strong buds 15-20cm above soil level before growth begins.

When conditions are dry the lawn should be scarified to remove moss and thatch before cutting with the mower blades on a high setting for the first few cuts, weed and feed and moss killer should be applied just before rain is forecast.

Slugs and Snail will need to be controlled with sharp sand or slug pellets especially around Delphiniums, Hostas and Lupins as soon as new shoots begin to appear. *John Boon*

News from Phyllis Tuckwell Hospice

The hospice is continuing to provide the same expert, compassionate Hospice Care as it always has, from alternative locations, while building work on its new hospice continues.

Its In-patient unit (IPU), which offers symptom management and endof-life care, has been temporarily relocated to Camberley under Phyllis Tuckwell management and the care is given by the same Phyllis Tuckwell staff as in the old Hospice.

The Community team continues to care for patients in their own homes or care homes, providing support for them and their families as they live everyday life with their illness, and offering compassionate end of life care for patients who are spending their last days at home.

The Living Well services for individual outpatient appointments and groups are based at the Beacon Centre in Guildford, recently refurbished with new consulting and group session rooms, updated IT infrastructure, and flooring materials and colours appropriate for dementia care.

Phyllis Tuckwell provides Hospice Care for people who are living with an advanced or terminal illness, such as cancer, and its new state-of-theart Hospice will enable its specialist teams to care for more local patients and families in the coming years. About our Cathedral......



You may not be aware that a vandal has smashed one of the panes of glass on the west front door of our Cathedral – part of a sacred set of sentinel angels carrying musical instruments engraved on each door by renowned artist John Hutton. These striking and beautiful engravings are an acclaimed piece of 20th-century art. The vandalism took place in the early hours of the 12th of January. A Cathedral representative said that everyone is devastated by this senseless act and hoped the whole community will recognise that places like our Cathedral need to be preserved as shrines of peace, tranquillity, and spirituality.

The Artist, New Zealander John Hutton (1906-1978), spent most of his career in the UK. His ashes are buried beneath a stone at the foot of the acclaimed West Screen that he created at Coventry Cathedral. Hutton's glass panels on the west front doors of our Cathedral were completed in 1961 and are an example of his later work. Additionally, internal doors on the south transept of our Cathedral are one of Hutton's early glass engravings, completed in 1955. He felt strongly that his work must be more than purely decorative: that it must be part of the spiritual surge of the architecture.

Surrey Police have charged a man in relation to a series of offences on the 11th & 12th January, including criminal damage at Guildford Cathedral. Insurers have estimated the cost of replacing and restoring the single pane of glass and additional damage to be over £15,000 but the Cathedral advises that this does not cover the total costs of the repair and it has launched a fundraising appeal to cover these additional costs.

Whilst John Hutton died many years ago some of his students are still active in glass engraving and our Cathedral plans for one of these students or someone with appropriate experience to be engaged to undertake the new engraving. I shall be following this issue and the actual engraving over the next few months and will report in due course.

AS MAD AS A MARCH HARE

Lewis Carroll also refers to the madness of the March hare in *Alice in Wonderland:* "The March hare will be much the most interesting and perhaps, as this is May, it won't be raving mad – at least not so mad as it was in March."

The phrase comes from the observation that hares run wild in March, The beginning of their rutting season, exhibiting excitable behaviour such as racing and boxing.

The phrase first appeared in print in the late 14th century in Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales,* and has remained popular ever since, though in recent years it has been superseded by similar phrases such as "mad as a box of frogs", or "mad as a bag of hammers".
