



#### **Letter from the Youth Worker's Office**

Spring has Sprung! Welcome to the April edition of the Parish Magazine!

There is a feeling of change in the air as we move from one season to the next. From the dark, cold, bare months of winter, April brings light, warmth and life. The bulbs, planted by the Green Team last October, start to bloom, the grass (now in need of a jolly good mow) is growing fast. At our house we have seen, or more accurately, heard, the return of our resident house sparrow, "Shouting Joe Feathers". Whose return, it must be said, is not always welcome at 4:00am but he certainly heralds the beginning of spring! A season full of new life has begun.

It is the same here at St John's. As we come to the end of the season of Lent, a time of self-discipline, fasting and stripping things back, we move toward the Season of Easter and celebration! Easter, a time of transformation, change and joy! We celebrate Jesus' victory over death and the hope of new life through him.

One of the activities we did with the Year 2s, from Merrow Infants, on their Lent retreat at Wintershall, was to ask them to draw on a stone. On one side a simple black cross to remember the sad events of Good Friday, on the other something that brings them immense joy (everything from family to holidays, sunshine to chocolate) to remember the joy of Easter Sunday. Then we asked them to separate the two sides of the stone.... And oh boy did they try! But no matter how hard they tried they could not break that stone in two. We cannot have the joy of Easter without the sadness of Good Friday. So come along this Holy Week and join us as we walk the events of that last week of Jesus's life.

On Palm Sunday, we begin Holy Week with Sam the donkey coming to church to remember Jesus riding in to Jerusalem greeted by great crowds. Following this we have a service each day, up until Good Friday, so that you can really experience the Easter Story with us. Then on Good Friday, a solemn day, we have a Family Service in the morning followed by hot cross buns and our Good Friday Liturgy in the afternoon.

Finally, on Easter Sunday, come and celebrate with us! We will be getting out the Alleluias which we hid at the beginning of Lent (if I can remember where I hid them!) and the 10:00 service will be followed by an Easter egg hunt in the churchyard. We hope to see you there to celebrate this season of new life! See our Holy Week poster for more details on all our services – on Page 9 and on the church noticeboards. *Georgie* 

#### Parish Pilgrimage to Winchester Cathedral Saturday 10th May

Our Parish Pilgrimage to Winchester Cathedral on 10<sup>th</sup> May will give us an opportunity to spend time together in worship, prayer and fellowship in the historic surroundings of Winchester Cathedral.

The day will be led by our own Revd Tim Clifford Hill and includes a private tour of the cathedral, a Pilgrim's Mass and lunch at the cathedral. In the afternoon we can either spend time in reflection in the cathedral or explore this most historic and ancient city. We shall then join in Choral Evensong in the cathedral before returning to Guildford.

The itinerary will be:

10.00 – Depart St John's Centre by executive coach

12.00 - Pilgrim Mass in the Lady Chapel followed by lunch and an afternoon tour of the cathedral

15.00 – free time followed by Choral Evensong

18.30 – Depart for home (estimated arrival time 19.45)

The cost per head will be £44 which includes executive coach travel, a quality lunch, cathedral tour and gratuities. Help with the cost is available if required – see the Rector. Bookings will open in early April.

#### St John's Electoral Roll – preparation of a new Roll in 2025

Every church in the Church of England is obliged to have an Electoral Roll which is a register of people who are able to elect other people in the church. This is reviewed every year and the updated Roll published before the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) which will be in May 2025.

Every six years a completely new roll is prepared where every person who wishes to have his or her name entered on the new Roll, **whether** it is entered on the present Roll or not, is requested to apply for enrolment.

I shall be contacting current members from the end of March with a form to fill in and information on how and when to return it.

Being entered on the Electoral Roll shows commitment to St John's and the wonderful people who make up our church community. The Roll itself demonstrates the strength of this community and enables members to take a full part in and vote at the Annual Meeting, to be involved in any necessary decision-making and stand for various positions such as member of the PCC and sidesperson. The Roll is voluntary and confidential and not open to general scrutiny.

I decided to have a second pancake. Chocolate and banana this time. I reflected - hold the two thoughts together and we have a good foundation for the future. With God's help that is.

### Christian Aid Week 2025 – 11th-17th May

## What is Christian Aid doing in their 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary year?

Christian Aid has been fighting poverty and injustice for eighty years and this year is focusing on

Guatemala in Central America.

There the climate crisis is killing Amelia's precious crops. She relies on the land to feed her eight-year-old son, Lázaro, and four-year-old daughter, Yakelin.

Amelia says: 'I worry about what my children will eat.'

A river passes through Amelia's farm, but deadly heatwaves are causing it to run dangerously low. Both communities and crops stand to lose life-giving water.

The cruel injustice is that Indigenous communities like Amelia's have done the least to cause the climate crisis, yet they endure its impact the most. As their farms are devastated, the search for solutions becomes critical: 'With high heat, there is little we can do but adapt.'

Amelia's hopeful that she can combat extreme weather by changing the way she farms. With the support of specialist training from Christian Aid partner, Congcoop, Amelia's planting resilient crops, conserving water and making fertiliser.

Amelia's also a leader in her community, sharing her knowledge with other households, so that one day, no family will worry about their children going without food. This is the unstoppable power of Amelia's hope in action.

With 7 days to make a difference, every gift, act and prayer counts.

Will you demonstrate the unstoppable power of hope and help fund vital tools and training, so farmers like Amelia can push back against the climate crisis and beat hunger?

- £6 could pay for the seed trays that kickstart a plant nursery at someone's home.
- £10 could pay for the pruning scissors that mean a farmer can care for their cacao trees.
- £20 could buy two pounds of climate resilient seeds that diversify a family's crop.

#### What can we do?

We'll be having a collection for Christian Aid in church on 11th May and we'll also have a St Johns e-envelope as usual to give directly to the Christian Aid website. Look out for more information in May's magazine and in church.

This is our third monthly report on the three Charities of the Year supported by St John's. This month we focus on the international

dimension and our support of Compassion UK.

This is the UK arm of the worldwide Compassion charity, an avowedly Christian organisation helping disadvantaged children around the world through individual sponsorship, along with childcare initiatives such as clean water, health treatments, pre and post-natal care and education resources. Working solely through partnerships with UK and overseas churches it enables Christians in the UK to help directly those in most need without having to navigate the problems of working through government agencies and bureaucratic bodies.

We support Compassion specifically in Haiti, a Caribbean country of some 12 million people, which is still suffering from the disastrous earthquake in 2010; a devastating hurricane in 2016; and lately a ganglaunched insurrection which toppled the government. Haiti is the poorest country in Latin America and the Caribbean with more than six in ten people living in poverty.

Since 1968, Compassion has helped nearly **127,000** Haitian children through some 350 church partners. This is especially important as families must cover the cost of education. Most schools in the country are run by religious and not for profit organisations and charge only a small fee. But with the cost of transport, books, and the mandatory uniform, many Haitians just can't afford to send their children to school.

St John's helps with prayer and cash donations and a number of our church members sponsor individual Haitian children.

#### Help wanted with the Parish Magazine

The guest editors generally produce two issues of the magazine a year. They are sent a document template with the magazine cover, adverts and regular pages already inserted. They then insert articles from both regular and occasional contributors and are free to add anything of particular interest to them. After proof-reading they send the completed copy to the printers.

#### **Advertisments manager**

- responds to new requests for advertising and liaises with the advertisers to help them prepare their copy if necessary.
- uses Microsoft Word to insert, move around and delete adverts as required into the existing magazine template.
- invoices advertisers when their advert has appeared and issues repeat invoices to regular advertisers once a year. This has been done manually up to now by email but the church has just bought new bookkeeping software which the adverts manager will be able to use in future.
- checks with the treasurer that payments have been received. This will happen automatically with the new system.
- thanks advertisers for paying.
- each month gets the template ready for the guest editor by adding a cover photograph kindly supplied by Jane Stevenson and updating the regular text if necessary.

#### St John's Men in Fellowship Walk Friday 21st February

Our latest MiF walk began and ended at Tilford, a picturesque village at the confluence of two tributaries of the Wey. As we set out under Martin Day's enthusiastic leadership, the going was slightly muddy but

signs of the coming of spring were everywhere. Gradients were deceptively easy at first, but then tightened to an unremitting climb of 330 yards at 1 in 30 till we reached the first summit. Brakes on for a short, rather muddy descent then a gentler down-gradient emerging on to a road.

Onwards on more sandy terrain through a wood in a conservation area, past an artisan cheese atelier, then pressing on further till we arrived at the appointed location for the coffee break, next to a "bird hide" at Frensham Little Pond. Joe Bullock produced a fully working Thermos from nowhere and served us with superb coffee, accompanied by a full assortment of Family Circle biscuits.

We now had to tackle the highlight hazard of the trip: a multi-span plank bridge with the centre span soaring nearly 100 mm above the edge of a small body of shallow water. Thanks to the excellent coffee, however, all participants managed to cross it.

Next up, a well-appointed piggery on the right, swiftly followed on the left by a flock of sheep including a mother sheep, known to us only as "Z", and her two new lambs "Z1" and "Z2", their pink ears glowing in the grey late morning light.

Round the corner and Tilford came back into view, with the Barley Mow to welcome us. To our surprise and delight they had managed to complete a major renovation on time, so we were able to have our lunch indoors, which, it being February, had to be good news. Good food and even better conversation and, sadly, all too soon it was time to return to Merrow.

#### **Merrow Infants Lent Retreat**

In my other work, with Wintershall, one of the things I do is help with their education programme. We run Advent and Lent workshops, as well as leavers and staff retreat days. So, it was really special to be able to bring my St John's work and the work I do at Wintershall together recently!

The Year 2 children from Merrow Infants came along on Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> April to take part in a Lent retreat day. A time for them to retreat from their daily lives and spend time thinking and wondering about the story of Easter, while enjoying the beautiful countryside and peaceful surroundings.

They began exploring the Easter story in our rehearsal barn by watching a piece of drama, a monologue from Pontius Pilate deliberating over the difficult decision he had to make about a prisoner

called Jesus.

Then on we went, to meet Sam and Denzel the donkeys and talk about the start of Holy Week; Jesus riding into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday.

Next we walked to St Francis Chapel, which marks the start of the Wintershall stations of the cross. Each child was given a pilgrim bag to carry on their journey up the hill, stopping at each of the 14 statues to reflect. Each statue is distinctive, each commissioned by a different artist. At each station we heard about what was happening to Jesus,



said a prayer and collected an item for their bags to help them remember each stage of Jesus' journey.

After lunch (and a jolly good run around!) we gathered in the theatre barn to hear the Godly Play story of Lent and how it relates to Easter.

Then on to the three afternoon activities. They heard all about what it was like to be a Roman in Jesus' day- seeing the armour they would have worn and trying some on.

They sat down at low tables, to a Passover meal, trying some of the foods that Jesus and his disciples would have eaten at his last supper whilst considering the words Jesus spoke to his disciples. "Eat this in memory of me; drink this in memory of me."



Lastly they were given the chance to get creative in our craft room. We talked about how the image of the cross has been depicted in art over centuries and the children were given time to create their own cross from different materials.

It was such a great day- enjoyed by all- and a real joy for me to share a place I love with the children and staff of Merrow Infants.

#### **Icons on Ammunition Boxes**

At the cathedral you can see a deeply moving exhibition, Icons on Ammunition Boxes. It highlights religious icons painted on reclaimed ammunition boxes from Ukraine's war zones. These poignant works bear silent witness to the violence and suffering of conflict while offering hope and reflection during the Christian season of Lent. The

exhibition is on till 21st April.

#### **Gardening hints for April**

We certainly have had a dry March so far - do not speak too soon, now we await the April showers in the hope that they will bring forth the May flowers.

Second early potatoes should be planted in the first half of the month leaving maincrop potatoes until the end of the month. Beetroot, carrots, leeks, lettuce, radishes, spring onions and turnips can now be sown outdoors. Brassicas should be sown in small pots for transplanting later in the summer. Broad beans which were sown indoors in the autumn can now be planted out.

Tomato seedlings which have developed their first true leaves should be potted up. Plant summer flowering bulbs such as gladioli and liliums.

Remove faded daffodil and tulip flowers leaving the foliage to die back. Dead head pansies and other spring flowering bedding plants to encourage a continuous display.

Sweet peas can still be sown outdoors, plant out Autumn sown plants into their flowering positions.

In the greenhouse sow the seeds of summer bedding plants such as French marigold and tagetes; once they have germinated and have produced a good pair of leaves they should be pricked out into seed boxes before they become leggy.

Cuttings can be taken from dahlias which were started into growth last month. Prune choisya, forsythia and viburnum immediately after flowering. Tie in honeysuckle and clematis branches as they begin to climb.

Cut back lavender to keep the plant bushy, do not cut into old wood as it will not produce new growth. Lift and divide large clumps of herbaceous perennials.

Increase the feeding and watering of indoor plants, repotting into a larger size pot any which are overcrowded or pot bound.

Continue mowing the lawn with the mower blades set on a higher cut, apply weed and feed with mosskiller or lawn sand as necessary.

Slugs and snails are enjoying a banquet at this time of the year with new growth appearing everywhere. They are particularly looking forward to the new shoots of delphinium, hosta and lupin. Use either animal friendly slug pellets or a dressing of sharp sand, grit or crushed eggshell to deter them.
